1. *if* and *when*

‘wenn’	▶ <i>when</i>	‘_____’ (temporal) <i>When I go to the shops tomorrow, I'll get you a comics.</i>
	▶ <i>if</i>	‘_____’ (conditional) <i>If I go to the shops tomorrow, I'll get you a comics.</i>

2. Conditional Type 1

<i>if</i>-clause	main clause
<i>If you go,</i> _____	<i>I'll come with you</i> _____
<i>If you have a good idea,</i> _____	<i>let me know!</i> _____
<i>If you have time,</i> _____	<i>we can play tennis.</i> _____

3. Conditional Type 0

<i>if</i>-clause	main clause
<i>If you heat ice,</i> <i>If you touch a fire,</i> _____	<i>it melts.</i> <i>you get burnt.</i> _____

4. Comma

Use a comma if the *if* is at the _____ of the sentence.

Don't use a comma if the *if*-clause is at the _____ of the sentence.

If you go, I'll go with you.

I'll go with you if you go.

Conditional clauses

1. *if* and *when*

'wenn'	▶ <i>when</i>	'sobald' (temporal) <i>When I go to the shops tomorrow, I'll get you a comics.</i>
	▶ <i>if</i>	'falls' (conditional) <i>If I go to the shops tomorrow, I'll get you a comics.</i>

2. Conditional Type 1

<i>if</i> -clause	main clause
<i>If you go,</i> present simple	<i>I'll come with you</i> will-future
<i>If you have a good idea,</i> present simple	<i>let me know!</i> imperative
<i>If you have time,</i> present simple	<i>we can play tennis.</i> can (auxiliary)

- ▶ possible, probable

3. Conditional Type 0

<i>if</i> -clause	main clause
<i>If you heat ice,</i> <i>If you touch a fire,</i> present simple	<i>it melts.</i> <i>you get burnt.</i> present simple

- ▶ always true!

4. Comma

Use a comma if the *if* is at the beginning of the sentence.

Don't use a comma if the *if*-clause is at the end of the sentence.

If you go, I'll go with you.

I'll go with you if you go.
